The Borris House Festival of Writing and Ideas this year will build on the maiden voyage of 2012 in which Colm Toibin, Lionel Shriver, John Banville, Stephen Frears, Mike Scott, AC Grayling and others visited the small village of Borris. The weekend of 8 and 9 June this year promises to bring together some of the most intriguing international minds – novelists, journalists, film-makers, poets, theatre directors, war correspondents, biographers, artists and political commentators – for a weekend of dialogue and discussion.
